Lyle Jamieson Visit to the LIWA

Lyle Jamieson's recent hands-on workshop and demonstration for the LIWA was an unqualified success. I strongly recommend viewing his DVD on bowl turning made safe and simple and his DVD on deep hollowing using the laser system he developed.

It appears that an old dog can be taught new tricks. The Jamieson grind does enable you to safely turn a bowl with an Ellsworth type bowl gouge and a spindle gouge. The push and pull cuts along with a scraping and shear scraping cut is all you have to master. Riding the bevel is the common sense way to turn a bowl.

Keep an open mind. You may think that you know all you need to know about turning a bowl. There is more to learn. This method makes beautiful ribbons fly without any effort. Speak to any of the members who took the two-day workshop. Norm Abrams, former Club president, called me shortly after the workshop and said he practiced what he had learned and has not had this much fun turning in many years.

It is very easy to maintain the grind of your tools with a Wolverine jig from

OneWay. Determine the angel of your bevel using the Verigrind jig that holds the gouge (55-60 degrees). The swept back sides are a function of moving the arm in or out until you are happy with the side bevel. Grind often and keep your tool sharp. Your final shear scrape cuts should be done with a tool that was just sharpened to raise a nice burr. You can sharpen your spindle gouges without changing the position of any of your gigs. Place a small block of wood (1/2 to ¾" thick) inside the arm. This will change the grinding angel to 30-35 degrees and you are set to turn the back end of a bowl that the big bowl gouge can not reach.

The deep hollowing system works very well. The new carbide cutter allows you to make pealing cuts inside your forms with ease. The laser used properly enables you to turn without fear of going through a piece. It makes determining the bottom of your form an easy and safe task.

Have fun grinding and turning.
