
## Long Island Woodturner's Association

#### Note from the President Ken Deaner

The LIWA seeks to meet the needs of all of its members. We plan for three outside demonstrators this year and hope to present some great in-house demonstrations as well. I would like to see workshops for

beginners on bowl turning, plates, platters, boxes, bird houses, ornaments etc. and for the more experienced: texturing, carving, coloring, finishing and much more. We need discussions on design, bringing concepts to fruition and the *art or turning*. **You** should contact Joel Rakower with requests for (outside) or Pete Richichi (in-house demonstrations) you would like to see.

We need more of our members to step up and demonstrate at our meetings. A hallmark of the turning world and of our Club is a willingness to share our knowledge with others in well-prepared demonstrations. We need demonstrators who can be clearly heard and understood to show us what they know. We understand that preparation takes time but it is time well spent. You will receive personal satisfaction in knowing that you have inspired others to carry on a centuries' old tradition of creating lathe turned objects.

If you need hands on instruction you should ask for it. The Tuesday morning meetings are a good start.

Steve Fulgoni and Joel Rakower would like to meet once-in-a-while in the evening for some hands-on turning. If you are interested, space can be provided and times arranged.

There are members who are skilled at teaching a novice how to turn. Contact Club officers to help arrange for lessons.

The first Tuesday morning group (meeting at 9:00 AM John Kowalchuk's shop) is committed to turning projects that will be donated to BOCES in May of 2009. Every member should contribute a piece to BOCES in appreciation of all they do for the Club. You do not have to wait until the spring to donate. Bring a piece to a meeting and give it to Norm Abrams, Carl Saenger or Ken Deaner. They will make sure it gets to BOCES.

The Club has run successful outreach programs in the past. Norm Abrams was instrumental in bringing LIWA members and Wilson Tech carpentry students together to teach the students the fundamentals of hands-on turning. I will ask Norm to contact

BOCES to see if this could be repeated this year.

Marty Mandelbaum has asked that we teach some Cub Scouts to turn. I will ask Marty to contact this program to see if this can be arranged.

Members new to turning can improve their skills by brining their work to meetings and asking more experienced turners to make some critical suggestions about their work. We love to see what you are doing at any skill level.

This can be the best turning year yet. It depends upon what you are willing to contribute to the LIWA.

Steve Fisher-2 sapele and maple boxes

C. Panzner-black walnut 3 footed bowl,

**C. Saenger-** 2 cherry burl bowls, figured maple bowl w/ textured rim w/ burn lines

**Don Lindsley**- 2 axis cherry vase w/ voids filled w/ malachite

**Bill Holland-** steamed and bent staved rosewood vessel

**Ken Deaner**- 3 carved and textured dishes, lg. carved, textured, colored wavy maple bowl

# **September 27 Demonstration Melissa Bishop**

Melissa began the demonstration by showing some of the various ornaments that she has turned. A variety of woods and materials were used including rhododendron, pink ivory, crab apple and a sea urchin shell for the globes.



Melissa began by turning the finial. After truing the blank, she used a 3/8 "spindle gouge to shape the finial. For optimum stability, Melissa urged turners to keep as much material near the blank as possible.

Melissa shaped the finial similar to a Hershey candy kiss. Before parting the sanded and finished finial from the blank, Melissa drilled a small opening at the top to accept a thin rod which acts as the ornament hook. The hook is held with CA glue.

Melissa had hollowed the globe section prior to the demonstration to save time.

Next the bottom or "icicle" section was turned. Melissa turned the blank between centers and roughed to a cylinder. Using a spindle gouge, she shaped the icicle to appear "drippy". A tenon was formed at the top for gluing into the bottom hole in the globe.
