MID MONTHLY MEETING -NOVEMBER 7

The mid-monthly meeting for November was held at Peter Schultheiss' house. Ken Deaner demonstrated two deep hollowing systems. Members in attendance tested the two systems and had mixed reviews as to their effectiveness and ease of operation. Thanks to Ken for bringing the two hollowing tools and allowing us a chance to try them out.

October Demonstration Cindy Drozda

Cindy Drozda began by outlining the steps and procedures to turn a finial box. Ms. Drozda is noted for her simple but eloquently shaped finials.

She uses kiln-dried wood with straight grains for the finial. The wood she used for this demonstration was 2" X 2" X 3 ½ ". Instructions for making this box are on her website. www.cindydrozda.com

Cindy uses the golden mean; 1 to 1.618 or 2/5 to 3/5 or 1/3 to 2/3 to determine proportions of the box bottom and the finial.

She tries to include one of these proportions in at least one significant portion of the whole box.























The blank is mounted with the lid towards the headstock.

The lid is then hollowed out, sanded to 4000 grit and finished with **Kiwi** clear shoe polish and

often a decorative gemstone is inserted on the inside bottom of the lid.

The lid is removed and the box base is mounted in the chuck.

Cindy then formed a jam chuck to inlay a contrasting wood to form a foot.

Cindy used a sharply ground detail gouge to form her delicate finials. The sides are swept back acutely to form two skew like cutting edges on each side of the gouge.

She stressed to support the thin finial with the left hand and not to apply too much pressure as that will cause the finial to bend which will result in a poorly formed and finished shape.

Cindy draws out a design of the box base and finial before any turning occurs.

Ms. Drozda took time and used great patience in finalizing the finial. With several coves and beads formed in the 2 to 3 inch finial, we could all witness the precision and artful design with which she completes her pieces.

Cindy sands the inside of box by using a one inch form pad with a 2 inch piece of sandpaper cut back at the edges to form strips of sandpaper. This allows the underside of the finial to be sanded but still retain the precise fit to the box base
