

October 17th Demonstration Len Mulqueen-Staved Vessels

Club member **Len Mulqueen** offered his techniques and expertise on creating a segmented staved vessel.

Len prefers eight staves in his pieces. After cutting the proper angle to each stave side, Len "dry fits" the pieces together. If the miter

joints are slightly off and a gap is evident on any of the joints, he uses a belt sander to form a perfect mating.



Len uses TiteBond glue for his pieces.

Len fashions a bottom disc of solid wood for the staved vessel. Very dry wood is necessary for this piece of the turning. Little or no movement is critical for the piece not to split and create gaps.

Len occasionally uses green wood for his glue blocks. A blowtorch applied to the block will remove enough moisture to ensure stability when gluing the staved vessel to the block.

Len stressed that the turner must be "willing to fail". He encouraged everyone to try different techniques and expand your field of endeavor.

Defects in the wood can be saved. Cracks, checks or other imperfections in the piece can be enhanced by burning, coloring, or decorating in some manner.

Len emphasized "that form is the most important consideration in a turning".

"Take your time". If the piece is pleasing to the eye and gives a sense of balance and flow, fine workmanship will only add to its success. Len brought in many examples of his staved vessels. These pieces varied from local to exotic woods in a myriad of shapes and sizes. It is easy to see how Len's skilled techniques and expertise have produced such beautifully shaped and finished turnings.



Throughout his discussion, Len credited fellow club member Jim Diamond for his artistic development and appreciation for form when turning a piece. Jim has been and continues to be an influence and mentor to many of our members.

Thank you Len for your time, enthusiasm and expertise in preparing this discussion.
