AAW Exhibit/Challenge

The following article and additional information can be found be visiting the AAW website. **LIWA President Ken Deaner** is asking our membership for any ideas for this collaborative project. Please give it some thought over the summer months.



The American Association of Woodturners will celebrate its 25-year anniversary in 2011 the St. at symposium. One of the many special events there will be an exhibition, Turning 25 - A Celebration. Each chapter of the AAW is encouraged and welcome to enter this exhibit. The exhibit goal is to have AAW chapter every represented and for each chapter to enter a latheturned work that exemplifies and represents that chapter.

The chapter can choose its own process for selecting a piece for the show, whether it is

collaborative effort, or a chapter juried selection from members' work. Entries for the show will be submitted online on the AAW website. Ground rules for each piece are:

- One piece per chapter
- Piece must fit in an 8" cube
- Weight limit is 3 pounds
- Entry fee is \$40
- Entry deadline is February 28, 2011
- All entered work must be for sale
- All pieces must remain with the exhibit for any traveled venues after the symposium
- Sales will be shared 70% with the chapter/or artist and 30% with the AAW
- Sold work will be shipped to the buyer at the end of all exhibits, and unsold work will be returned to the chapter

The entry fee will help defray the expense of a special display setup, return shipping to the buyer or the chapter, plus a very nice exhibit catalog for each participating chapter that will have a picture and description of each exhibit piece. The exhibit will be displayed in a prominent area at the symposium and each participating chapter will be clearly recognized for their contribution.

With over 325 AAW chapters, this exhibition will be quite large, very unique, and a powerful display of the skills and talent in our chapters. It would be awesome to see all chapters represented. June 12, 2010 Demonstration

Graeme Priddle

This was the second visit to the LIWA for Mr. Priddle. He has over 20 years of turning

experience. He began as a bowl turner and evolved to his present work in an effort to tell his "stories" and interpretations of the woods he uses.



"Less is more" is Graeme's credo when woodturning. He urges other turners to keep the shape simple and regard the form before any other embellishments are added.

Graeme uses native New Zealand woods for most of his pieces .He began his presentation by emphasizing the planning phase. He started by drawing and outlining the desired shape on the raw blank.





After the shape design was marked on the blank, Graeme used a bowl gouge to remove some wood. He stressed that the gouge must be presented at a 90 degree angle to the wood surface, when beginning the cut, so the cutting angle has supporting

fibers to prevent tear out and skating the tools across the flat surface. Once the cut has begun, a gradual turning of the body, keeping the arms in place securely against his body, will enable the turner to obtain a smooth, well-defined cut.

Graeme reminded the group to observe the wood grain and how it should be cut at a 45 deg. angle to lessen tear out. Keep a sharp edge on the tool and let the bevel rub throughout the cut. He uses steeper angled gouges for the inside bottom cuts of a bowl.

He recommends using a smaller sized gouge for the finishing cut. (Fewer fibers are being removed)

For this demonstration, Graeme created an eccentric bowl on the outer side. He then undercut the edge of the bowl with a Rolly Munro articulated hollowing tool. Graeme used the mini version of this tool.





For the top side of the turning, Graeme created three small bowl openings eccentrically. He used a faceplate to turn each cavity and moved the faceplate slightly each time.

In the latter part of his talk, Graeme demonstrated several ways that he embellishes his pieces by carving, piercing, burning and coloring. When burning designs, Graeme creates his own shapes by

bending nickel chromium wire and inserting it into the burning tool tip.
