FEBRUARY MEETING

Our February 16th meeting was held at Steve's warehouse because BOCES was closed. In Joe's absence, Ken collected dues. There was no treasurer's report. Joe, along with Steve and Don, will update the membership roster. It was announced that the AAW had their liability policy reinstated. The club will pay \$90 per year to be covered under their policy. Participants at activities outside of BOCES will be requested to sign release forms. In order to eliminate time constraints imposed by BOCES, we will try to have outside demonstrators use Steve's warehouse.

A brief report of the Tennessee Turning Symposium was presented by Joel and John

Our librarian, Richard Barth, has requested that all borrowed items not be used be returned at the next meeting. The club will continue to purchase DVDs for the library.

Our Membership Chairman will prepare a new membership application form and a mentoring kit for new members.

Also, all members will be asked to provide emergency contact information.

Mike Josiah informed us that the woodturning show has returned to CREATE TV. Bob Urso ran the tool and wood raffle.

DEMONSTRATION

Paul MacMenamin began his demonstration by cleaning up the tool rest on his mini-lathe with a file. He talked about using compression springs on his tail stock and banjo to allow them to move freely. Paul cut the ends off a pod and placed it between centers using a safety drive. He turned a tenon with his skew and mounted the pod in a chuck. He stressed using a face mask and dust mask due to the seeds and the amount of dust created. Paul brought up the tail stock for support and rough turned the pod to get rid of the fuzzy surface material.

He began shaping the pod with a bowl gouge and then removed the tail stock to continue shaping the end with a spindle gouge. He turned and sanded a finial before shaping the thicker section. Seeds were dug out using a sharpened nail. He then continued to sand the piece to 1200 grit and parted it off. Paul also showed how to hollow a pod with his spindle gouges in order to install a contrasting wood finial. He suggested trying to fill all or some of the seed holes with minerals or other inlays.
