DEMONSTRATION - by Martin Rost on Preparing and Presenting a Demo, How to Turn an Egg and Turning an Ornamental (or functional) Birdhouse

During his egg demo, Martin showed his plexiglas centering jig. After mounting his blank between centers, he used a bedan tool to turn away excess wood on the ends and reduce the diameter of the blank. He then used a spindle gouge to shape the egg and then installed it in a pvc pipe fixture consisting of 1 1/2" pipe glued to a pvc adapter with a 2" face plate attached. This was attached to the head stock, the tail stock was brought up and the egg was taped into the pipe's end for sanding and finishing.

For the ornamental birdhouse, Martin started with a square blank with holes predrilled for the opening and perch and partially hollowed. For functional models, he suggested leaving the inside rough to help the fledglings climb out. Also, when turning the mortise in the decorative roof he suggested a fairly loose fit to accommodate some swelling from the glue. For functional units, he suggested 3 s/s screws so the birdhouse can be cleaned out at the end of the season.
